**ORDINANCE NO. 1741**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 225 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK 1971, ENTITLED “WATER”, TO REPLACE SECTION 225-5, “REGULATIONS” WITH NEW REGULATIONS REGARDING OUTDOOR**

**LANDSCAPE WATER IRRIGATION CONSERVATION MEASURES.**

WHEREAS, the water supplies within the Glen Rock municipality should be protected to afford the greatest beneficial use to Glen Rock citizens and businesses, which depend on adequate water supplies for their livelihood, health, welfare, and economic production; and

WHEREAS, the water resources associated with the Glen Rock municipality have been threatened in the past due to drought conditions; and

WHEREAS, there exists a need to ensure water is available for uses essential to the health, welfare and safety of the Glen Rock municipality and for averting or lessening the impact of any water shortage; and

WHEREAS, taking steps to ensure clean, wholesome, and adequate water supplies is a high priority in protecting the health, safety, and welfare of Glen Rock citizens;

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:48-2, the Glen Rock municipality has the power to adopt ordinances necessary and proper for the protection of persons and property, and the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare;

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 225-5. The Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Glen Rock 1971, Section 225-5, entitled "Regulations" is hereby amended by being replaced in its entirety with the following:

**I. Water Use Restrictions**

This subsection supercedes any user restriction of Stage I and II imposed by the Village of Ridgewood Water Department. For restrictions beyond Stages I and II see subsection II below, titled Water Emergency. Restrictions on outdoor landscape water use apply to all non-governmental properties in Glen Rock including residential, commercial, and religious properties at all times regardless of source of supply (e.g. public water supplies, well or ground water, lakes, streams, or ponds) unless expressly exempt in subsection VI. Exemptions.

**A. Irrigation of lawns and landscapes by conventional irrigation systems or devices (not equipped with a SMART controller). These include hose-end irrigation systems or conventional automatic irrigation systems.**

1. May only be done two days per week: Tuesday and Saturday (odd numbered addresses) or Wednesday and Sunday (even numbered addresses);
2. Watering shall only be conducted between the hours of 5pm and 10am;
3. The watering of any single area shall not exceed 30 minutes per day (hose-end sprinklers), 15 minutes (spray/mist heads) or 50 minutes (rotary heads);
4. No watering shall be permitted when it is raining;
5. Conventional automatic irrigation systems shall be equipped with an operational automatic rain sensor device, which disables the system when ½ inch or more of rain has fallen in a single rainfall event.

**B. Irrigation of lawns and landscapes with automatic irrigation system equipped with a SMART controller. A SMART controller is defined as a weather-based irrigation controller or soil moisture-based irrigation controller meeting specified criteria and labeled as being compliant under the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)**

WaterSense program. Such a controller is capable of estimating or measuring depletion of available plant soil moisture and operating the irrigation system as needed while minimizing excess water use.

1. The SMART controller shall be installed and programmed by a contractor who holds a New Jersey Landscape Irrigation Contractor Certificate pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:5AA-3. The following exceptions shall apply:
    - a. Certification shall not be required for public employees performing work on property of the public entity, for vendors of landscape irrigation components, materials or equipment delivering, rendering advice or assistance or performing normal warranty service for such equipment, for contractors installing or performing work on irrigation equipment to be used solely for agricultural purposes or for licensed plumbing contractors.
    - b. Certification shall not be required for homeowners performing work on landscape irrigation systems on their own properties.
  2. The SMART controller shall be programmed to irrigate between the hours of 5 PM and 10 AM. Irrigation may occur on any day of the week, in accordance with the programmed profile.
    - a. Proper sprinkler head data and accurate soil/plant/irrigation information shall be entered by the installer;
    - b. A copy of the controller programming data in printed form shall be retained by the system owner, for later use if needed;
    - c. The installer shall ensure that the system is correctly installed and programmed to achieve the desired irrigation profile;
  3. The SMART controller must be listed by the U.S. EPA as an approved irrigation controller displaying the “WaterSense” symbol on the product label or nameplate, and listed in the EPA database of approved controller manufacturers and model numbers.
  4. The property owner shall register the SMART controller with the Glen Rock Building department at a one-time fee of \$25 with an application to include the manufacturer and model number.
    - a. The municipality will issue a yard placard which the owner must display signifying that the property is irrigated with a SMART controller.
- C. All new residential irrigation systems must be in compliance with either subsection A, above, or with subsection B, above, and also must be in compliance with Glen Rock building code requirements.
- D. All systems shall be maintained to remain in compliance with the requirements of this subsection and to minimize the use of water and avoid wastage, including water puddling, system leakage, and runoff.
- II. Water Emergency:  
When water restriction Stages III or IV is imposed by the Village of Ridgewood Water Department, the following applies:  
A. Stage III, Pending/Critical: Mandatory restriction of irrigation to the use of a hand-held hose on Tuesdays and Saturdays for properties with odd-numbered addresses and

Wednesdays and Sundays for properties with even-numbered addresses. No irrigation of any kind shall be allowed on Mondays, Thursdays, or Fridays.

- B. Stage IV, Critical: Irrigation is prohibited at any time. Exceptions for irrigation using a hand held hose may be allowed under conditions prescribed by the Village Manager or the Village of Ridgewood.
- C. Exception to the user restrictions shall be determined by the Village Manager or the Village of Ridgewood.

### **III. Violations**

A. Violations include knowingly or recklessly watering or irrigating or permitting irrigation of lawn or landscape on owned, leased, or managed property that results in the following:

- 1. Watering during any form of precipitation;
- 2. Irrigating on days or hours not permitted in this section;
- 3. Water leaking from any irrigation equipment;
- 4. Water puddling on landscape or impervious surfaces;
- 5. Water run-off from irrigated property;

B. Violators of these guidelines and requirements are subject to fines and penalties described in subsection V, Penalties. In the event the violation occurs on leased property, the violation will be issued to the tenant.

### **IV. Enforcement of Water Conservation Guidelines**

The water use restrictions and automatic rain sensor requirements imposed pursuant to this section shall be enforced by the local authorized official. Whenever a local authorized official shall find a violation of the water use restrictions, regardless of the source of the water (public supply or private source), such authorized official shall issue a written warning and explain the penalties for additional offenses, as provided in subsection V, Penalties.

### **V. Penalties**

After a warning for a first offense in accordance with subsection III above, any person or business that thereafter violates the water use restrictions imposed pursuant to this section shall be subject to a warning, followed by a fine of \$100 for a second offense within the same calendar year, and \$250 for additional violations within the same calendar year. For the first year following enactment of this ordinance, the police department will issue warnings when violations occur. Fines will take effect starting from April 1<sup>st</sup> 2017.

### **VI. Exemptions**

Restrictions in subsection I above do not apply to the following:

- A. Outdoor water use from rain water harvesting (rain barrels etc.), gray water, or reclaimed water. Use of gray or reclaimed water must have an approved NJPDES permit issued through the NJDEP.
- B. Flowers and shrubs may be watered as needed with a hand-held hose or drip or micro irrigation equipped with an automatic shut-off nozzle.
- C. Watering of vegetable gardens.
- D. Outdoor water use for commercial nurseries.

- E. Outdoor irrigation necessary for one day only where treatment with an application of chemicals. require immediate watering to preserve an existing landscape or to establish a new landscape.
- F. Outdoor irrigation necessary for the establishment of newly seeded or sodded lawns or landscaping within the first 21 consecutive days of planting.
- G. Water use for recreation purposes for children.

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**Ordinance Procedure: # 1739 (AR-1 Zone)**

**Date of Final Reading: April 13 2016**

**Date of Introduction: March 30, 2016**

Mayor Packer announced that a request to change the density from 30 to 25 has been received. However, according to the Land Use Law in order for a change of this significance to be made the initial process of a first reading when need to be conducted. Consequently, we will be conducting a final reading of Ordinance 1739 as it was initially presented.

A motion to open public discussion on Ordinance 1739 was made by Council member Surrago, seconded by Council member O'Hagan. All were in favor.

Joe Connor, 455 Prospect Street - Mr. Connor asked who requested the change in the density. Mayor Packer replied the developer and his attorney. Mr. Connor replied the density of 30 is still an issue for the majority of people in town. It is not only the size of the structure but the number of people that would be occupying this space will have a huge impact on traffic, environment and wildlife in the area. Mr. Connor reminded the Council that what we do now will affect generations to come.

Jim Seaton, Ferndale Avenue - Mr. Seaton clarified this zone is specific to this area. Mr. Seaton asked what affect this complex would have on the property values of the neighboring properties. Mayor Packer replied he has been told it would not decrease property values; however he is not the expert.

Vietta Grinberg, 58 Ellsworth Terrace - Mrs. Grinberg asked if this is a legal requirement that we must satisfy or simply us addressing a recommendation that was made. Mayor Packer replied it is not a legal requirement but rather the Master Plan. Mrs. Grinberg believes this does not fit with the character of the town and is very much opposed to it. Mrs. Grinberg disagrees and believes it will most definitely decrease property values.

Bill Sonzogni, 26 Belvidere Road - Mr. Sonzogni clarified that the Master Plan is simply a recommendation on what we should do moving forward to serve our residents the best. Mayor Packer stated that is correct. Mr. Sonzogni asked where this project fits in with the State's Fair Share mandate. Mayor Packer stated the AR-1 proposal was in no way aligned with the Affordable Housing. Mr. Sonzogni stated he believes at this time the Borough does not have an obligation to meet an affordable housing requirement. Mayor Packer replied we most definitely have a

requirement. Borough Attorney Suarez agreed, stating there is no COAH requirement; however the Borough Planner is working with the State to determine our number. Mr. Suarez noted if this zone is approved it will be used to show the State the Borough's intent to meet whatever obligation.

David Schlett, 339 Gramercy Place - Mr. Schlett asked if comparable sites were looked at for density on an acre as well as if traffic patterns were reviewed. Mayor Packer replied the density number came from a conceptual plan that was presented to the Planning Board several years ago and signed off on by the Planner. Additionally, there was a parking study conducted; however, this evening we are simply discussing the zone. If the zone is approved, the developer would present a site plan at which time a traffic study would be conducted.

Greg Morgan, 451 Prospect Street - Mr. Morgan reiterated several points he previously brought up concerning the density and the front setback. Mr. Morgan believes 50' would be appropriate for the front setback.

At this point, Mr. Suarez explained that our Borough Planner (Burgis) is working with a Court appointed specialist to create a plan with regard to the number of units that are required in Glen Rock.

Mr. Morgan asked if the AR-1 zone is created for Prospect Street does this increase the chance that some developer will come along and try and use that standard for another part of town.

Mr. Suarez stated this is a spot zone for this area. Additionally, there isn't a lot of vacant land in Glen Rock so the town isn't going to go around rezoning other areas of town.

Mayor Packer added by creating this zone it will actually decrease the chances of this happening simply because we are showing the Courts that we are making a conscious effort.

Mr. Morgan commented it seems to be premature to be addressing this issue as the new Council is still being brought up to speed.

Bob VanLangen, 62 Concord Avenue - Mr. VanLangen is the current Chairman of the Planning Board. Mr. VanLangen commented that this ordinance has been presented to the Council three different times. Mr. VanLangen also chaired the re-examination of the Master Plan. The town has to learn how to get things done and get out of its own way on projects like this. There have been several misstatements and misunderstandings which are causing us to second guess everything that has previously been done. The first clarification is the updated Master Plan which called for several initiatives to take place over the next five years. These included addressing the senior and age-restricted housing, upgrade the commercial districts and possibly adding additional multi-family housing. These are all part of the long term plan to change 91% of the current tax base from coming from residential properties. Mr. VanLangen emphasized that the town cannot survive living budget to budget without creating things that will benefit Glen Rock in the long run. The recommendations set forth in the Master Plan were all done with the significant seasoned advice of council members, planners, engineers and professionals who know what they are doing, we do not! Incredibly long and arduous discussions have been had concerning the density numbers and bulk requirements of this ordinance. The numbers may not be what we, as laymen, want; however, professional opinion states they are all well within the parameters of the ordinance. Mr. VanLangen expressed embarrassment that we cannot get out of our own way and get this done. If we are not going to do what the professionals recommend then shame on us. This is simply a zoning ordinance and nothing else. Please do not kick this can down the road once again.

**Gabe Bullaro, Doremus Avenue - Mr. Bullaro disagreed with Mr. VanLangen noting professionals have varying opinions and can make mistakes. This is our town and we know what is best for our town. Mr. Bullaro stated the Planner has not given any strong evidence that there is a need for age restricted housing. There is nothing in this ordinance that protects Glen Rock residents as being offered these apartments. The indecisiveness of the density shows there is no correct number. We're spending a lot of time on something that may not even house Glen Rock residents.**

**Jim Seaton, Ferndale Avenue - Mr. Seaton stated he has spoken to many people, whom were all against it; however, they feel the Council is going to do what they want regardless of public opinion. Council member O'Hagan disagreed.**

**Alan Bronner, 522 Doremus Avenue - Mr. Bronner stated he is putting a consortium together to purchase property that is of an acre in size. They will be tearing down the houses and putting up AR-1 type housing. The streets they have looked at so far are Concord and Dunham.**

**Stacy Welch, 451 Prospect Street - Ms. Welch commented the Master Plan also states we need to keep the residential nature of the town. Clearly, we need a balance between the two types of housing. Ms. Welch believes there will be issues with traffic, noise and people. There are too many questions that have not been answered.**

**Terry Moore, 35 Pamrapo Ct. West - Mrs. Moore commented this is an ordinance the Council is trying to vote upon, not a site plan. Mrs. Moore referenced the expansion of the Main Street parking lot and objections from the neighboring property owners (much like this change). Had this parking lot not been expanded then our current parking issues would be far worse now. This ordinance has gone back and forth between the Planning Board and Council with several revisions. The need has been demonstrated by the number of residents 55+ who have moved to neighboring towns as there was nothing available in Glen Rock. This ordinance is far more stringent than other towns which only protects Glen Rock.**

**Kay Tuite, Glen Courts - There was a lot of controversy when Glen Courts was proposed and divided the town dramatically. Fortunately, Glen Courts was built and did move forward. If we cannot think forward, which is going to mean change, our taxes are not about to freeze, we have to think forward and move forward with this zone.**

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**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

**Section 1.** The Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery, new information technology equipment and a new fire engine (partial funding) and new automotive vehicles, including original apparatus and equipment, in, by and for said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. The cost of the improvements includes all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

**Section 2.** There is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements described in Sections 1 and 4 hereof (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), the respective amounts of money hereinafter stated as the appropriation for said respective purposes. Said appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized, and the down payment and Federal grant appropriated, by this ordinance. Said improvements shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

**Section 3.** It is hereby determined and stated that the making of such improvements is not a current expense of said Borough.

**Section 4.** The several purposes hereby authorized for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued are set forth in the following "Schedule of Improvements, Purposes and Amounts" which schedule also shows (1) the amount of the appropriation and the estimated cost of each such purpose, and (2) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the Federal grant hereinafter appropriated, and (3) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance such purposes, and (4) the estimated maximum amount of bonds and notes to be issued for each such purpose, and (5) the period of usefulness of each such purpose, according to its reasonable life, computed from the date of said bonds:

**Section 5.** The cost of such purposes, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$72,000 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purposes, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

**Section 6.** The sum of \$30,000 received or to be received as a grant from the Bergen County Community Development Program, pursuant to the Federal Housing and Community Development Act, is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of the ADA accessibility restroom improvements at the Main Line Train Station authorized in Section 4.J hereof.

**Section 7.** It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$150,000, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Borough, are now available to finance said purposes. The sum of \$150,000 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purposes.

**Section 8.** To finance said purposes, bonds of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,604,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

**Section 9.** To finance said purposes, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,604,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

**Section 10.** Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity

with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized to sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 11. It is hereby determined and declared that the average period of usefulness of said purposes, according to their reasonable lives, taking into consideration the respective amounts of bonds or notes authorized for said purposes, is a period of 13.70 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 12. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$1,604,000 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 13. Any funds received from private parties, the County of Bergen, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of such purposes (other than the Federal grant hereinbefore appropriated which shall be applied to the cost of such purposes, but shall not be applied to the payment of outstanding bond anticipation notes and the reduction of the amount of bonds authorized), shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purposes, or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for such purposes shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 14. The Borough intends to issue the bonds or notes to finance the cost of the improvements described in Sections 1 and 4 of this bond ordinance. If the Borough incurs such costs prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes, the Borough hereby states its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself for such expenditures with the proceeds of such bonds or notes in the maximum principal amount of bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance.

Section 15. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited and general obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Borough for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes, without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 16. The capital budget is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available for public inspection.

**Section 17. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.**

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE BOROUGH CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK, CHAPTER 216-33 SCHEDULE V ENTITLED “VEHICLES & TRAFFIC; SCHEDULE V”**

**WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Glen Rock recognize the need to amend the Chapter 216-33 Schedule V of the Borough Ordinance as follows:**

**Now, therefore, be it ordained as follows:**

**SECTION 1.**

**Chapter 216-33 Schedule V is amended and supplemented as set forth below.**

- a. 216-33 Schedule V, “West Plaza” is deleted under the subheading, “Name of Street”, and in its place the following is added, “Jean Baker Wunder Way”.**
- b. 216-33 Schedule V, “West Plaza” is deleted under the subheading, “Location”, and in its place the following is added, “Jean Baker Wunder Way.”**
- c. All references to “West Plaza” throughout the code shall be deleted, and “Jean Baker Wunder Way” shall be added in its place.**
