**BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK
ORDINANCE NO. 1716**

BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE MAKING OF VARIOUS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW ADDITIONAL OR REPLACEMENT EQUIPMENT AND MACHINERY, NEW COMMUNICATION AND SIGNAL SYSTEMS EQUIPMENT, NEW INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY EQUIPMENT AND A NEW FIRE ENGINE (PARTIAL FUNDING) AND NEW AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLES, INCLUDING ORIGINAL APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT, IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$2,125,487 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO APPROPRIATE A FEDERAL GRANT, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery, new communication and signal systems equipment, new information technology equipment and a new fire engine (partial funding) and new automotive vehicles, including original apparatus and equipment, in, by and for said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. The cost of the improvements includes all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements described in Sections 1 and 4 hereof (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), the respective amounts of money hereinafter stated as the appropriation for said respective purposes. Said appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized, and the down payment and Federal grant appropriated, by this ordinance. Said improvements shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that the making of such improvements is not a current expense of said Borough.

Section 4. The several purposes hereby authorized for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued are set forth in the following "Schedule of Improvements, Purposes and Amounts" which schedule also shows (1) the amount of the appropriation and the estimated cost of each such purpose, and (2) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the Federal grant hereinafter appropriated, and (3) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance such purposes, and (4) the estimated maximum amount of bonds and notes to be issued for each such purpose, and (5) the period of usefulness of each such purpose, according to its reasonable life, computed from the date of said bonds:

SCHEDULE OF IMPROVEMENTS, PURPOSES AND AMOUNTS

A. Undertaking of the 2015 Street Resurfacing and Sidewalk Reconstruction Program at various locations in the Borough. It is hereby determined and stated that said streets being improved are of "Class B" or equivalent construction as defined in Section 22 of the Local Bond Law (Chapter 2 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes Annotated, as amended; the "Local Bond Law").

B. (i) Acquisition of new additional or replacement equipment and machinery for the use of the Department of Public Works ("DPW") consisting of (a) trailers, (b) a loader and (c) a log splitter and (ii) undertaking of the following public improvements: (a) undertaking drainage improvements at various locations, (b) undertaking the Sewer Root Control Program at various

locations, (c) installation of a lightning detection system and undertaking of security improvements and rest room renovations at Wilde Memorial Park, (d) undertaking interior improvements at the Fire House, (e) undertaking field renovations at Upper Faber Field, (f) undertaking the Tree Replacement Program at various locations, (g) elevator upgrade and security improvements at the Municipal Building and (h) undertaking various improvements to the Main Line Train Station. It is hereby determined and stated that the public buildings being improved are of "Class B" or equivalent construction as defined in Section 22 of the Local Bond Law.

It is hereby determined and stated that (a) the Trustees of the Free Public Library of the Borough have requested, pursuant to Section 40:54-25 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey, as amended, that the Borough raise the sum of \$225,537 in order to finance the aforesaid improvement and (b) said public building being improved is of "Class B" or equivalent construction as defined in Section 22 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 5. The cost of such purposes, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$55,537 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purposes, including

architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 6. The sum of \$25,487 received or to be received as a grant from the Bergen County Community Development Program, pursuant to the Federal Housing and Community Development Act, is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of the ADA improvements to the Main Line Train Station authorized in Section 4.J hereof.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$105,000, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Borough, are now available to finance said purposes. The sum of \$105,000 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purposes.

Section 8. To finance said purposes, bonds of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,995,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 9. To finance said purposes, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,995,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 10. Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized to sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 11. It is hereby determined and declared that the average period of usefulness of said purposes, according to their reasonable lives, taking into consideration the respective amounts of bonds or notes authorized for said purposes, is a period of 12.40 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 12. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$1,995,000 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations

prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 13. Any funds received from private parties, the County of Bergen, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of such purposes (other than the Federal grant hereinbefore appropriated which shall be applied to the cost of such purposes, but shall not be applied to the payment of outstanding bond anticipation notes and the reduction of the amount of bonds authorized), shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purposes, or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for such purposes shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 14. The Borough intends to issue the bonds or notes to finance the cost of the improvements described in Sections 1 and 4 of this bond ordinance. If the Borough incurs such costs prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes, the Borough hereby states its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself for such expenditures with the proceeds of such bonds or notes in the maximum principal amount of bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance.

Section 15. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited and general obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Borough for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes, without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 16. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 150 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK - 1971, AS AMENDED, ENTITLED “PARKING”; BEING AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS FOR PARKING ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY WITHIN THE BOROUGH; TO PROVIDE FOR PARKING PERMITS ON VARIOUS STREETS DURING THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE GLEN ROCK MIDDLE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Borough of Glen Rock has concluded the reconstruction of its Middle School and High School; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body desires to amend weekday parking on the streets surrounding the Glen Rock Middle School and High School with the conclusion of such reconstruction; and

NOW, THEREFOR, BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council, the Borough of Glen Rock, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section I - Chapter 150 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Glen Rock 1971, as amended, entitled "Parking," is hereby amended as follows:

A. There is added thereto a new Section 150-12 entitled “On-Street Permit Parking For High School Administrative and Educational Staff” to read as follows:

“150-12 On-Street Permit Parking For Middle School and High School Administrative and Educational Staff and Affected Residents.

A. Any Glen Rock Middle School and High School Staff Member, or residents residing in the areas defined in Subsection “E” herein, possessing a valid parking permit issued in accordance with this article shall be allowed to park in the locations specified in Article “E” below

between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on any weekday when the Glen Rock Middle School and High School are open.

B. Parking permits shall be issued by the Glen Rock Board of Education in accordance with priority lists and other regulations adopted by the Board of Education upon the completion of a permit application and production of a valid driver’s license. Permits shall be issued without fee.

C. The Glen Rock Police Department shall be provided with an updated list of all permits issued/revoked or cancelled to allow for the enforcement of this Ordinance.

D. All other ordinances regulating parking on the streets listed in Subsection “E” shall apply except during the days and hours specified herein.

E. The issuance of any parking permit shall not constitute a guaranty that a parking space will be available for the designated motor vehicle.

E. Streets Restricted to Parking Permit:

F. Parking permits shall be displayed in accordance with written instructions provided by the Glen Rock Board of Education at the time the permit is issued.

G. Any person violating any of the above provisions of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in accordance with the violation and penalties section 150-4 of this chapter.

Section II. VALIDITY-SEVERABILITY If the provisions of any section, subsection, paragraph, subdivision, or clause of this Ordinance shall be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall not affect or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the section, paragraph, subdivision or clause directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered.

Section III All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section IV This Ordinance shall take effect on April 1, 2009 and upon passage as required by law.
