ORDINANCE NO. #1897

BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK

CALENDAR YEAR 2023

ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK

(N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock in the County of Bergen finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2023 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$160,514.92 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and

WHEREAS the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2023 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Glen Rock shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$561,802.22 and that the CY 2023 municipal budget for the Borough of Glen Rock be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

 - Foreperson hourly wage to include at minimum \$3.00 differential above Laborers hourly rate for each year of the contract 2023 2025.

4. Article XIII – VACATIONS

- H. Employees who have not had the opportunity to use all vacation time in a given year may carry over no greater than 50% of their earned vacation time. Vacation carry-over shall be used between January 1 and April 30 of each year, to include floating holidays.
- I. Employees may submit their requests for vacation time off one year prior to their vacation. All vacation requests are to be submitted by February 1 of each year in which the days are to be taken. Seniority will control only for the vacation requests submitted by February 1 of any given year. Thereafter, vacation time off will be granted on a first come-first served basis. Article XXXI – STIPENDS AND PAY DIFFERNTIAL

C. Sidewalk Inspector – A Municipal Services employee will be trained to perform sidewalk inspections and appointed on an annual basis. The current stipend for the sidewalk inspector is \$2,036.80, subject to the increases set in Article XIII for the years of this contract, 2023 - 4%, 2024 - 3% and 2025 - 2.5%.

D. NEW JERSEY LICENSED SEWER OPERATOR

a. The Sewer Operator stipend will be an annual appropriation of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) per year added to the base pay of the individual holding the position.

This amount will increase in subsequent years of this contract subject to the annual percentage increase reflected in Article XIII, 2024 - 3% and 2025 - 2.5%.

E. TREE FOREPERSON STIPEND

- a. The tree foreperson, holding a CTE certificate, will receive an annual appropriation of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) added to the base pay of the individual holding the position. This amount will increase in subsequent years of this contract subject to the annual percentage increase reflected in Article XIII 2024 3% and 2025 2.5%.
- b. Tree climber to receive \$250 per day when performing function. Position must hold a valid CTE or LTCO license to receive stipend. This amount will be constant each year of the contract.

The Borough proposed hiring of two (2) DPW laborers, whose job description will include daytime response to Glen Rock Fire Department calls. These employees will be required to respond to calls for service for the GRFD from 7 am to 3:30 pm. Employees must have Firefighter I training at the time of hire. Employees must possess a CDL license, or the ability to obtain within 6 months of hire. Failure to possess these requirements of the position will be cause for separation of service. Employees hired will be placed in the on-call rotation the following January of date of hire.

SECTION 2.

All other parts, portions and provisions of Chapter 150 of the Borough of Glen Rock Code, be and the same, are hereby ratified and confirmed, except where inconsistent with the terms thereof. In the event of any such inconsistency, the terms of this Ordinance shall be deemed to govern.

SECTION 3.

The Committee shall concern itself with matters pertaining to the general welfare of senior residents, including but not limited to housing and such other duties which may be appropriately assigned. The Committee shall, from time to time, report to the Borough Council. Members of the Committee shall serve for terms of one year or until their successors are approved and qualified."

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 216 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK - 1971 AS AMENDED ENTITLED "VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC" BEING AN ORDINANCE CONTROLLING VEHICLE AND TRAFFIC REGULATION WITHIN THE BOROUGH; TO AUTHORIZE THE INSTALLATION AND PLACEMENT OF TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES ON OR NEAR DESIGNATED MID-BLOCK CROSSWALKS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section I - Chapter 216 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Glen Rock 1971, as amended, being an Ordinance entitled "Vehicles and Traffic," is hereby amended as to the following subsection:

A. Subsection 23 entitled "<u>Mid-Block Crosswalks</u>" is hereby amended to add the language that is emphasized in boldface italics below:

The streets or parts of streets described in Schedule XX attached to and made a part of this chapter are hereby designated as mid-block pedestrian crosswalks. The stopping or standing of vehicles within 25 feet of the mid-block crosswalks is prohibited. Appropriate *traffic control devices*, *including*, *but not limited to*, *signs and* pavement markers may be installed *or placed* on such streets, or parts of streets, consistent with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices and consistent with the provisions of this chapter.

Section II VALIDITY-SEVERABILITY If the provisions of any section, subsection, paragraph, subdivision, or clause of this Ordinance shall be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall not affect or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the section, paragraph, subdivision, or clause directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been

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Section III All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section IV This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage as required by law.

BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE MAKING OF VARIOUS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW ADDITIONAL OR REPLACEMENT EQUIPMENT AND MACHINERY, NEW INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY EQUIPMENT AND NEW COMMUNICATION AND SIGNAL SYSTEMS EQUIPMENT IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$1,383,500 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO APPROPRIATE A STATE GRANT, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT OR FULLY FUND APPROPRIATIONS FROM THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Glen Rock, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery, new information technology equipment and new communication and signal systems equipment in, by and for said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. The cost of the improvements includes all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements described in Sections 1 and 4 hereof (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), the respective amounts of money hereinafter stated as the appropriation for said respective purposes. Said appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized, and the Capital

Improvement Fund moneys (either to make a down payment or to fully fund appropriations) and the State grant appropriated, by this ordinance. Said improvements shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that the making of such improvements is not a current expense of said Borough.

Section 4. The several purposes hereby authorized for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued are set forth in the following "Schedule of Improvements, Purposes and Amounts" which schedule also shows (1) the amount of the appropriation and the estimated cost of each such purpose, and (2) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the grant hereinafter appropriated, and (3) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the appropriation from the Capital Improvement Fund hereinafter made to either fully fund the appropriation or to provide a down payment, and (4) the estimated maximum amount of bonds and notes to be issued for each such purpose, and (5) the period of usefulness of each such purpose, according to its reasonable life, computed from the date of said bonds:

Section 5. The cost of such purposes, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$100,000 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purposes, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 6. The sum of \$219,000 received or to be received as a grant from the State of New Jersey Department of Transportation is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of the resurfacing of Doremus Avenue (Phase II) authorized in Section 4.A hereof.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$164,500, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Borough, are now available to finance said purposes. The sum of \$164,500 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purposes.

Section 8. To finance said purposes, bonds of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,000,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law.

Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 9. To finance said purposes, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,000,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 10. Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be

renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized to sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 11. It is hereby determined and declared that the average period of usefulness of the purposes to be financed with bonds or notes, according to their reasonable lives, taking into consideration the respective amounts of bonds or notes authorized for said purposes, is a period of 14.45 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 12. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$1,000,000 and that the

issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 13. Any funds received from private parties, the County of Bergen, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of such purposes (other than the State grant hereinbefore appropriated which shall be applied to the cost of such purposes, but shall not be applied to the payment of outstanding bond anticipation notes and the reduction of the amount of bonds authorized), shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purposes, or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for such purposes shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 14. The Borough intends to issue the bonds or notes to finance the cost of the improvements described in Sections 4.A and 4.B of this bond ordinance. If the Borough incurs such costs prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes, the Borough hereby states its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself for such expenditures with the proceeds of such bonds or notes in the maximum principal amount of bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance.

Section 15. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited and general obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Borough for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes, without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 16. The capital budget is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available for public inspection.

Section 17. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 1902

BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK

BERGEN COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 162, ARTICLE 1 OF THE BOROUGH CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK, "PROPERTY MAINTENANCE – BRUSH, GRASS AND WEEDS"

WHEREAS, the Borough of Glen Rock has determined that it is in the best interests of the health, safety, and welfare of its residents to establish a property maintenance code governing the safe, clean, and orderly maintenance of all lands within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 162, Article 1 of the Borough Code sets forth specific provisions with respect to the maintenance of brush, grass and weeds; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Glen Rock has determined that it is in the best interests of the health, safety, and welfare of its residents to authorize the temporary suspension of all or a part of Chapter 162, Article 1 from time to time in order to address environmental conditions affecting the Borough.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained as follows:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 162, Article 1 of the Borough Code of the Borough of Glen Rock is hereby amended and supplemented with the addition of a new section 162-4.1 as follows:

- A. <u>Findings and determinations</u>. The Borough of Glen Rock hereby finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the health, safety, and welfare of its residents to authorize the temporary suspension of all or a part of Chapter 162, Article 1 from time to time in order to address environmental conditions affecting the Borough.
- B. <u>Definitions</u>. "Environmental conditions" may include, but are not limited to, rain or drought conditions, or seasonal conditions, such as the need for pollinator habitat as they emerge from dormancy.
- C. <u>Temporary Suspension Authorized by Resolution</u>. In order to temporarily suspend all or a part of Chapter 162, Article 1, the Borough shall adopt a resolution setting forth:
 - i. a description of which portions of Chapter 162, Article 1 are to be temporarily suspended;
 - ii. a description of the environmental condition prompting the suspension; and
 - iii. the duration of the suspension, which shall not exceed one calendar month.

SECTION 2.

All other parts, portions and provisions of the Borough Code of the Borough of Glen Rock are hereby ratified and reconfirmed, except where inconsistent with the terms thereof. In the event of any such inconsistency, the terms of this Ordinance shall be deemed to govern.

SECTION 3.

The terms of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable; should any part, portion or provision hereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional, said finding shall not affect any other part, portion or provision thereof.

SECTION 4.

This Ordinance shall take effect according to law.

BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK ORDINANCE # 1903

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CH 225 WATER

§225-1 Purpose.

The purpose of this article is to limit, restrict and regulate the use of water by customers of the Department of Water Supply of the Village of Ridgewood during periods of use and emergency, as hereinafter defined, in order to ensure public health and safety.

§ 225-2 **Definitions.**

For the purposes of this article, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

CONVENTIONAL IRRIGATION SYSTEM OR DEVICE

Hose end irrigation systems and automatic irrigation devices.

DRIP/MICRO IRRIGATION

An irrigation method that saves water and fertilizer by allowing water to drip slowly to the roots of many different plants, either onto the soil surface or directly onto the root zone, through a network of valves, pipes, tubing, and emitters.

EMERGENCY

Any period of water shortage or imminent water shortage caused by drought; lack or failure of proper pumping equipment, storage or other facilities; acts of God or public enemies; or excessive demand upon or use of water facilities or capacity.

HAND-HELD HOSE

A hose designed to be operated while being held in the hand and equipped with a nozzle that automatically shuts off when released.

IRRIGATION

The watering or sprinkling (including automatic sprinkling) of lawns, shrubs and gardens.

<u>NJDEP</u>

New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.

NJPDES

New Jersey Pollution Discharge Elimination System.

SMART CONTROLLER

A weather-based irrigation controller or soil moisture-based irrigation controller meeting criteria specified and labeled as being compliant under the United States Environmental Protection

Agency Water Sense Program, meeting the guidelines prescribed by Ridgewood Water and approved by permit from Ridgewood Water.

WATER

That water obtained, delivered and/or supplied to any persons by the Department of Water Supply of the Village of Ridgewood or pumped from private wells for residential irrigation purposes.

§ 225-3 Declaration of emergency.

The Village Manager is authorized to enforce the provisions of this article and, in their discretion, in consultation with the Director of Ridgewood Water, to determine and declare the existence and extent of an emergency with respect to the water supply of the Village of Ridgewood. The determination of the Village Manager shall apply to all communities served by the Department of Water Supply of the Village of Ridgewood, and notification of the emergency shall be promulgated to all such communities in the most reasonably expeditious manner. Interim emergency regulations may be adopted without notice by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood and shall apply to all communities serviced by the Department of Water Supply of the Village of Ridgewood and shall be promulgated in the most reasonably expeditious manner to all the communities.

§ 225-4 Public notice.

Public notice of the declaration of an emergency and the determinations made by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood shall be made in the most expeditious manner by publication in the legal newspaper for the Village of Ridgewood and, for the other communities served by the Department of Water Supply, by posting in each municipal building and at such other public places as shall be designated by the Village Manager and the local administrators or Clerks of the serviced communities. Notice shall also be disseminated through the press and the public in general. The emergency shall remain in effect until declared at an end by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood.

§225-5 Regulations.

The following irrigation schedule and water emergency regulations are hereby adopted to become effective as set forth herein:

A. Stage II Severe

Irrigation schedule, effective year-round:

- (1) All nongovernmental properties: Irrigation by a conventional irrigation system or device may only be done on Tuesday and Saturday for odd-numbered addresses and Wednesday and Sunday for even-numbered addresses.
- (2) Governmental properties: Irrigation by a conventional irrigation system or device may only be done on Monday and Friday.
- (3) Irrigation using a hand-held hose or drip/micro irrigation system shall be allowed any day.
- **<u>B.</u>** The emergency stages shall be as follows:

Stage of Emergency Regulation	Drought Emergency Condition	User Restrictions
III	Pending/Critical	Mandatory restriction of irrigation for all properties to the use of a hand-held hose on Tuesdays and Saturdays for properties with odd-numbered addresses and Wednesdays and Sundays for properties with even-numbered addresses. No irrigation of any kind shall be allowed on Mondays, Thursdays, or Fridays.
IV	Critical	Irrigation is prohibited at any time. Exceptions for irrigation using a hand-held hose may be allowed under conditions prescribed by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood.

- C. Stage II, III and Stage IV emergency regulations shall become effective upon declaration of each stage by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood. The cleaning of cars, houses or property, filling of swimming pools or other outdoor water usage shall be prohibited during Stage III and Stage IV.
- **D.** Exceptions to the user restrictions shall be determined by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood or a Village of Ridgewood employee designated by the Village Manager. The request for an exception shall be submitted on forms prepared by Ridgewood Water and shall include any required documentation. Exceptions will automatically be denied for customers with bill balances beyond 120 days. Exceptions are subject to renewal annually and may be voided at any time due to an emergency. The exceptions may include the following:
- (1) Outdoor irrigation necessary for the establishment of newly sodded or seeded grass lawns or landscaping within the first 21 consecutive days of planting.
- (2) Irrigation of lawns or plantings with smart controllers, approved by permit from Ridgewood Water, and limited to the irrigation hours specified in Section E of this Chapter.
- (3) Outdoor water use from rain harvesting (rain barrels, etc.), gray water, or reclaimed water.

Use of gray or reclaimed water must have an approved NJPDES permit issued through the NJDEP.

- (4) Outdoor irrigation necessary for one day only where treatment with an application of chemicals require immediate watering to preserve an existing landscape or to establish a new landscape.
- (5) Other outdoor water usage.
- **E.** Irrigation shall not be conducted between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on any day. Irrigation using automatic systems, including Smart Controllers, may only be used between 3:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on the permissible day.
- **F.** All automatic irrigation systems shall be equipped with an operational automatic rain sensor device. Each rain sensor device shall be capable of and programmed to interrupt the automatic irrigation cycle when 1/4 inch of rain has fallen.

§225-6 Discontinuance of water supply to premises in violation.

In accordance with N.J.A.C. 14:3-3A.l(a), violation of any provision of this article in such a manner as to produce disturbing effects on the service of the utility or other customers, the Village Department of Water Supply shall have the right and it is hereby empowered to cut off the supply of water to the premises and meter upon and from which such violation shall have taken place for such period or periods of time as shall be deemed necessary to secure compliance with all applicable terms of this article.

§ 225-7 Enforcement.

The enforcement of the provisions of this article shall be the responsibility of any officer and/or employee duly appointed by the Village Manager of the Village of Ridgewood, deputized by the governing body of the Borough of Glen Rock to provide such enforcement in the Borough of Glen Rock.

§ 225-8 Unlawful acts; minimum fine.

It shall be unlawful and a violation hereof for any person to use water during the emergency period in violation of this chapter. Any person found to violate this chapter shall receive two warnings and, thereafter, violators are subject to the general penalty as set forth in § <u>225-7</u> of this chapter. There is established herein, however, a fine of \$50 per violation, upon conviction of a violation.

§ 225-9 Violations and penalties.

A.

Maximum penalty. For violation of any provision of this chapter, any other chapter of this Code or any other ordinance of the Borough where no specific penalty is provided regarding the sections violated, the maximum penalty shall, upon conviction of a violation, be any combination of the following: a fine not

exceeding \$1,000, imprisonment for a period not exceeding 90 days or a period of community	service not
exceeding 90 days.	

<u>B.</u>

Separate violations. Except as otherwise provided, every day in which a violation of any provision of this chapter or any other ordinance of the Borough exists shall constitute a separate violation.

<u>C.</u>

Application. The maximum penalty stated is not intended to state an appropriate penalty for every violation. Any lesser penalty, including a nominal penalty or no penalty at all, may be appropriate for a particular case or a particular violation.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 101 "FEES" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Glen Rock recognize the need to amend Chapter 101 of the Borough Ordinance pursuant to Chapter 32-5 of the Borough Ordinance:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained that Chapter 101 of the Borough Ordinance is hereby amended to add::

Effective July 1, 2023, the following fees shall be collected for an annual badge for the use of the Borough's tennis and pickleball courts:

A. Glen Rock residents: \$40 per year

B. Glen Rock residents aged 62 or older: \$20 per year

C. Non-residents: \$60 per year

D. Non-residents aged 62 or older: \$40 per year

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 32-5 "TENNIS COURTS; KEYS" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF GLEN ROCK

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Glen Rock have determined that it is in the Borough's best interest to charge and collect fees for the use of the Borough tennis and pickleball courts in order to partially defray the costs of establishing and maintaining the same,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained that:

Chapter 32-5 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Glen Rock is hereby renamed "Tennis and Pickleball Court Rules for Usage" and is amended to state:

A. No person aged 12 or older shall be permitted to use the Borough tennis courts or pickleball courts without purchasing a tennis badge, to be displayed upon request. Any person under the age of 12 using the tennis courts or pickleball courts must be accompanied by an adult who has purchased a tennis badge.

B. Players may make a reservation to use the tennis courts and pickleball courts, which reservation shall commence play on the hour. A badge number evidencing purchase of a badge shall be required in order to make a reservation. Players who do not make a reservation must leave the court if a player with a reservation arrives.

C._Glen Rock residents will be permitted to make reservations for courts up to one week in advance of the time they wish to play. Non-residents will be permitted to make reservations for courts up to two days in advance of the time they wish to play, if those courts have not already been reserved. D. The time limits for court usage shall be one hour for singles tennis play, two hours for doubles tennis play and two hours for pickleball. For groups wishing to play doubles tennis or pickleball, two separate players may each make a one-hour reservation so that the full two hours of permitted time are reserved. Each player is limited to one one-hour reservation per day. At the end of the designated hour(s) of play, players may continue to play only if there are no players waiting and no other reservation has been made.

E. At Wilde Memorial Park, privately instructed lessons are only permitted on Courts 1 and 2 and are prohibited on all other courts. All provisions of this ordinance,

including those addressing tennis and pickleball badges, reservations, and hours of play, apply to privately instructed lessons as well as ordinary play.

- F. Section 101 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Glen Rock shall be amended to set forth a schedule of the fees to be charged for tennis badges.
- G. The Borough Administrator and the Director of Parks and Recreation are hereby directed to provide as quickly as possible for a system for application, registration and collection of fees for tennis badges and for reservations of the tennis and pickleball courts.
- H. Courts are to be used for tennis and pickleball only; no other use is permitted. Courts must be occupied by a minimum of two players. Roller skating, skateboarding, scooters and bicycle riding on the courts are prohibited at all times. Pets are also prohibited from the courts at all times.
- I. Tennis shoes or sneakers must be worn while on the courts.
